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Col. Shower Dies!

It is with sincere regret that I must notify the members, associates and friends of the 467th that we have lost our beloved commander. Col. Albert J. Shower passed away on October 15, 2001 at 1830 hours with his wife, Charlotte and his son Jay at his side. He was 91 years young. The Colonel was born and raised in Madison Wisconsin. From there he received an appointment to the US Military Academy at West Point from which he graduated with honors in 1935. Upon retirement, some 30 years later, he worked at General Motors where he inspected parts for the Apollo Spacecraft. He then became a Real Estate broker and then moved to Air Force Village in Riverside California some 15 years ago. As you all know, Colonel Shower was very active in various honor societies, veteran groups and community organizations. A list would

include The American Legion, Independent Order of Foresters, International B-24 Liberator Club, West Point Society of the Inland Empire, B-17 Combat Crewman and Wingmen, Second Air Division Association, 467th Bombardment Group (Heavy) Association, Ltd., Veterans of Foreign Wars, Norfolk Military Vehicle Group (Honorary Member) at Norwich, England, Knights of Columbus, TROA, Order of Doedalions, Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi, and the Distinguished Flying Cross Society. Colonel Shower is survived by his loving wife Charlotte, son Albert Joseph (Jay) Shower Jr., two daughters Katherine Tittman and Holly Rusinak, sister, Esther Touchen, eight Grandchildren and thirteen Great-Grandchildren. Rosary was said on Friday, October 26 at 1930 hours in the Chapel at Air Force Village West. A memorial service was held in the Convocation Room of the Air Force

Village West on Saturday, October 27 at 1500 hours. Colonel Shower wanted so dearly to make the November trip to England. It was only a short period prior to the trip that Charlotte had to cancel his plans. However, his son Jay went in place of him and Jay very commendable filled in on specific functions where the Colonel would have performed. Colonel Albert J. Shower was laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery at 1030 hours in Grave Number: 2225-A, Section 3, on McKinley Drive on November 16 in the year of our Lord 2001. The 467th had representation at all functions and sent a red and white carnation B-24 shape tail to the memorial service and a living planter with red and white cut carnations to the funeral.

EDITORS NOTE:

It is difficult for me to believe that this fine gentleman is no longer with us. He had so much vitality and was a ready participant in any venture. The words that I used, "beloved Commander" is true. However, 57 years ago at this time, I am not sure I would have spoken the same. During combat he never let us relax. If you weren't flying a combat mission, then you were flying a practice mission. If the weather was too bad for either, then you were in ground school. He always kept us busy. His perfection to formation flying was one of his prime objectives. We were taught to tuck it in and I have heard comments from my crew that the lead crew, when I flew #3 position, use to say they could serve coffee off of my

wing tip. Returning to the base was always interesting. He wanted tight turns; I believe he thought we could do in a B-24 what he could do in the P-47. I remember cutting out two aircraft in my approach to landing and the one I cut out near final was close to me and had a rather rough landing. The Colonel visited them, not me, but I heard about it in the Officers Club that evening. He truly encouraged sharp and tight flying. This exceptional leadership is the reason that we had fewer casualties and many more of us came home than from other groups. The fighters by-passed us on many occasions to get to the more loosely flown formations. I believe that many of the traits and positive aggressiveness that I developed after the war was a direct result of the influence of Colonel Shower. I went back to college got my BSME and ME degrees, served two years during the Korean War as an Air Force test pilot at North American Aviation Co., earned my Masters in Industrial Engineering and my Doctorate in Management. The Colonel at the most recent conventions would come up to me and say how much he appreciated what I was doing for the group. He never seemed to realize what he did over all of these years for the group could never be repeated by any one of us and my deepest regret is that I never took the time to say to him, "Thank you Colonel Shower for all the things you did for me that will last a lifetime".

FROM THE PREZ

NORWICH CONVENTION - Ralph Davis

The trip over was uneventful and we arrived in London around 0915 the next morning. We had transportation problems and finally got on the bus at 1400 hours. Traffic was terrific with a lot of construction and we arrived at the Nelson Hotel at 2030. A longer trip to Norwich than Detroit to London.

SATURDAY - NOVEMBER 3

Twenty-two members went to Barsham to view the memorial made by the community to Lt. Reid's crew. On the night of the intruders, April 24 1944, Denis Sporle as a young lad witnessed the crash. Six perished with the aircraft, four bailed out and one parachute did not deploy.

Of the three survivors, two later perished with other crews. Denis as a boy use to put flowers at the site and as he grew older, he became more and more interested in having a memorial to the crew. In April of 1999 it was completed and Mervin Shank, the lone survivor of the crew, and his wife attended the dedication. Our Group took this opportunity to present Certificates of Appreciation to two members of the community who had done much of the physical work on the memorial, Huby Fairhead and Gordon Honeywood and to Denis Sporle for his dedication. Jay Shower placed a wreath at the memorial in memory and performed this act in place of his father, Colonel Shower, who so very much wanted to be at this convention, but the Lord had another mission for him to perform. A plaque was given to Mr. Neville Smith, Chairman of the Parish Council for the Villages of Barsham and Shipmeadow recognizing their efforts in the memorial. Perry & Jill Watts provided a snack lunch serviced by community ladies and then we returned to the hotels.

SUNDAY - NOVEMBER 4

The 2ADA Business meeting was held at the Hilton Hotel. All members were designated delegates to the convention. The 2nd Air Division Association is covered for tax purposes under IRC Section 501 c (19), EIN 25-1227743. There was a tour of Blicking Hall for those who selected the tour. A buffet dinner was held at the Hilton Hotel for family members of all ages to meet each other, the Heritage League members and Friends of the 2ADA. This was a most interesting evening. David Hastings presented his slide show of the trip to England on Diamond Lil, the Confederate Air Force B-24. Many young members of the various local support organizations were present and spoke to the crowd. The buffet dinner was very good and everyone really enjoyed himself or herself.

MONDAY - NOVEMBER 5

There were three for this morning. **Buses took** everyone to Madingly Cemetery where a short memorial service was held. Walter J. Mundy, the new President of the Second Air division laid a wreath at the base of the monument. The ceremony was cut short due to traffic problems in transit. It is difficult to say that the cemetery is beautiful when the white crosses represent so many fallen comrades of America. From here we had one group going to Duxford Museum with lunch at the Officer's Club and two groups going to Chilford Hall for lunch with then part of them went to Wyndham College while the balance of the group went straight back to the Doris and I went to Duxford. It was most interesting as we got to see the B-24 from Lackland. They had it completely disassembled and were giving it a good going over to get rid of the corrosion. TUESDAY - NOVEMBER 6

Two trips were planned for today, one was a tour of Wroxham Barn and Arts Craft Center and the other was the boat tour of the Norfolk Broads. Doris and I did the boat trip and it was a very pleasant tour around the Broads. We had lunch at one of the local restaurants, which was a most pleasant event. The evening was our

Civic Reception and buffet dinner following the awards ceremony of the "FREEDOM OF THE CITY" to the Second Air Division Association. This event was held in the St. Andrews Hall. Nick Le Neve Walmsley played music at the organ and the Norwich City Concert Band brass ensemble. It began with the seating of the 2ADA members and the memorial trust governors. This was an award of the highest order. Norwich Lord Mayor Keith Ratcliffe handed over the scroll paying tribute to the continuing bond between the American airmen and the people of Norwich. He said there were reasons why the American airmen had such a special place in the hearts of so many local people. "Firstly, it is for their courage, determination and skill in the way they defended us. Secondly, for their sacrifice - they risked everything, their lives, their youth and their futures. Thirdly, it was for their company. There was an initial culture shock, after all everyone said they were over-paid, over-sexed and overhere," he laughed. "But they won over Norfolk hearts and a strong bond formed between them with the older generation, who looked upon them as sons, between their own generation and between them and the children, who they spoilt whenever they could with parties, candy and gum." Jordan Uttal, Honorary President of the 2nd Air Division Association accepted the Freedom of the City with this comment: "We came back in June 1963 just after the memorial library was finally completed. We were treated royally. We have been back several times since and we get goose bumps when people say to us "welcome home". Be sure we look upon you as part of our extended family. We thank you for being in our lives and we wish you the best." It was an impressive ceremony and in the true British style.

WEDNESDAY - NOVEMBER 7

The Memorial Library opening ceremony at the Forum was the day we were waiting for and the major purpose of our visit, the opening and dedication of the new Memorial Library. It all started with the memorial service of thanksgiving and remembrance in the cathedral. There was a procession of church and civic dignitaries and the Band of the Dragoon Guards. It was a most effective and impressive celebration. Members of the 2nd Air Division Association escorted the Standards and the Roll of Honour. The Rt. Rev Graham James, the Bishop of Norwich, remarked in his address that when this celebration was planned no one had any idea that American and British forces would be allies again in conflict. The music in the cathedral was overpowering. Several said they had not witnessed such performance before. In true British custom, the drizzle and low clouds came in. The fly past was scheduled for around noon and it was hoped that things would clear up to allow it. By 11:00 there were around 800 of us under the vaulting roof of the Forum. The new 2nd Air Division USSAF Memorial Library, the only one in the world, is twice as large as its predecessor and significantly more impressive. formal procession started at 12:00 noon from the West Door of St. Peter Mancroft Church, exactly as in 1963. The 2nd Air division Association members lined the route facing the Guard of Honour provided by the Royal Air Force Coltishall and the USAF Mildenhall in our honour.

At 12:05pm, after music by the Royal Air Force Regiment and a review of the Guard of Honour, the Royal Air Force and the USAF provided a Fly-Past with two Jaguars from Coltishall and a Tanker from the USAF at Mildenhall. Paul King, Chairman of the Memorial Trust said that the British regard 100 miles as a long way, and Americans regard a 100 years as a long time. He stated that at looking at these men taking their final bow in a country many regard as their second home, the thought occurs that their life span represents more than a quarter of their nations history. In a message from the Queen delivered by the Lord Lieutenant of Norfolk, Sir Timothy Colman, Her Majesty said "All of us will remember with everlasting gratitude their bravery and sacrifice in the defense of freedom during this country's hour of need. I hope that their entire visit to Norfolk will be a happy one strengthening still further the unique bond of friendship between our two countries." Major General Kenneth Hess, Commander of the 3rd Air force. based at Mildenhall, took the place of the US Ambassador, William S. Farish, who was unable to attend because of diplomatic duties, delivered a message from President George W. Bush. President Bush reiterated the words of President John F. Kennedy on the occasion of the dedication of the first memorial Library nearly 40 years ago: "They gave their lives in the defense of free men everywhere." General Hess and Sir Timothy Colman performed the opening ceremony. General Hess was a very good substitute as his father had flown B-24s out of Hethel. One of the striking features of the new Memorial Library is a 28ft mural depicting aspects of "The Friendly Invasion". Within it is a photograph of three members of the Women's Army Corps, one of them, dressed in a tin hat and pushing a fire bowser was our own 2nd AD VP Evelyn Cohen. This trip was looked upon as a "pilgrimage and a homecoming" by many in attendance. In the street in Norwich a billboard said: "Norwich Honours Wartime Heroes." And it was stated "did and does, the torch still flames.'

The Matthews Norfolk Brass played for the evening banquet at the Norwich Sport Village. There were around 800 people in attendance. Jordan R. Uttal, Honorary President of the 2nd ADA, was the Master of Ceremonies. He did an excellent job as always. One of the premier functions is the presentation of the Eight Candles of Remembrance. Brian H. Mahoney was the participant representing the 467th and his father, James J. Mahoney. The dinner was very good and the service was excellent. During the evening, Chairman of the memorial Trust, Mr. Paul King was presented with checks totaling \$200,000 (140,000 pounds). This is a good start towards the completion of the 500,000-pound goal to support the library. Buses returned to the hotels starting at 9:45pm. (It started raining again)

THURSDAY – NOVEMBER 8

This was Base Day for each Group. Because of our size, we had two buses. Our members were located at four hotels and we scheduled departure at 9:00am with a return around 9:00pm. It was a long, but most memorable day. Visiting all the old sights, lunch at the

Green Man and dinner at the Salhouse Lodge. The day could not have gone as it did without the very excellent planning and preparation on the parts of Jean and David Hastings and Jill and Perry Watts. We will always be in their debt for such a most reminiscent day to end all days. Once on our way, our first stop was a visit to the Rackheath Community Center for coffee or tea and biscuits. The Chairman of the Rackheath Parish Council made a welcome address. Geoff Gregory and myself had a few words in response and then we departed for the Salhouse Church for a memorial service. Geoff Gregory read a lesson Reverend Gordon Howells presided, and the Royal Air Force Neatishead provided a wreath party in tribute to the 467th. We then departed for the Green Man Inn for lunch where for once we had all the 467th together in one mass with friends and relatives. Soup and sandwich was excellent. About this time the weather started to look rather nasty as we departed the Green man for our one of a kind marker and it eliminated any possible chance of a fly-past that was arranged by David Our base tour, after leaving the marker, included "All Saints Church", the remaining portions of the runway, the restored T2 Hanger, former de-briefing building, Control Tower, The Golden Gates and Rackheath Hall. We also drove back to the residence of Air Vice Marshall John Howe to view his home and live stock of sheep. We then departed for the Rackheath Community Center for tea or coffee and a chat with the locals. I will never be able to write the total feeling of friendship shown by all the British people throughout our stay in England. We truly seemed to be a part of their everyday functions and were made to feel at home. We then departed for the Salhouse Lodge where we had our dinner and presentations. The meal was fantastic. They gave us a choice of four selections for the main menu. The rule of the day was, "order from the list". The service was exceptional and everyone enjoyed each other's company. Guests of the 467th were; Jean, David & Roger Hastings; Jill & Perry Watts; June & Edward Trafford; Sarah & Roger Lomax; Betty & Les Willis; Shelia & John Oakley; Annabelle & John Howe; Denis Sporle; and Andy Wilkinson. It was our one last "Harrah" to so many friends that we have treasured through out the years. David Hastings and Perry Watts were recognized for their outstanding work on preparing such a fine Group Day and were presented a plaque from the 467th. Then we departed for our hotels. The last day, Group Day, England showed us the typical weather I remember when I was there in November. It started out with rain and then through the day we saw snow, sleet and hail. Walking out of the Salhouse Lodge, we had about 1/2 to 3/4 inches of slush. But then Friday as we went to London, the sun came out. In all the weather was very good for November. We had sunshine everyday except for Group Day and the banquet on Wednesday. The Second Air Division says they will not make another trip to England. If the spirit moves us in the 467th, maybe we can make a trip on our own if enough members, family and friends want to make the trip. Think it over, I know some are getting up there in age, but Colonel Shower was 91 and it took the grim reaper to stop him from going. It is truly a deep regret of mine that he did not get to make the trip. Somehow through out the stay, I believed he was enjoying it with us.

FRIDAY - NOVEMBER 9

The trip for some started at 2:45am for some. We had sunshine for our departure and truly welcomed the good weather we had most all of our stay. Greetings from Texas via Norwich

Well now – if the creek don't rise & I don't buy any green bananas, I'll be writing this in 4 stages: home, British Airways, Norwich and home again.

First things first — We were all distressed to hear of the death of our Colonel just days before we left the States for Norwich. He will be praised & memorialized many times during our reunion. I just wish to say this: During the war, I was scared stiff of the Colonel. After the war, I came to know & love the man. I know now that he demanded the best in us and we are probably alive today because of that. He will be missed indeed! So Colonel, if you are reading this — We salute you! Your spirit will be with us in every future convention.

On to the convention – some 30 of us departed DFW for a pleasant and uneventful flight, passed quickly through customs, and it was evident that the Brits ere expecting us. Our British friends, acting as couriers, efficiently boarded us on the busses that took us – about 3 hours later – into the heart of Norwich and on to our hotels.

The city hadn't changed much – same shops, market place, hotels and Cathedrals. However, there was a bustle in the city that portends great future growth. Ah, but there is one new building that really catches your eye! It is "The Forum on the Millennium Plain" – the new home of the 2nd Air Division Memorial Library! A very large horseshoe shaped building, principally built of red brick and glass. This magnificent building dominates Central City; and is indeed, a beautiful new home for our Memorial Library!

I will try to describe the main events, which brought some 600 of us over the Atlantic to Norwich for this convention. Five major activities dominated our stay. They were: The Cathedral Service, the Presentation of "The Freedom of the City" to the 2nd Air Division Association, the dedication of the Memorial Library, the Banquet, and the 467th Base Day!

The Cathedral service was one of the most impressive I have seen in this venerable old Church. All 600 veterans with family members, plus hundreds of our English friends filled the Cathedral and overflowed into the close outside. The "Roll of Honor" was proudly

carried in formal procession to the Bishop of Norwich for consecration before being placed in our Library. The Dragoon Band, with the Cathedral organ, added to this memorable occasion.

The "presentation" was most impressive, with much "pomp & circumstance". The Town Crier announced all the dignitaries complete with wigs, plumes, regal robes, Mace and Sword, great band — all followed by a reception in Blackfriers Hall. A very enjoyable evening and we now have the "right" to advance up Prince of Whales Rd. with fixed bayonets, as well as the right to march down the street with our sheep! This is actually a very old revered "privilege" not given lightly, and never in the past given to an "organization".

Next came the event we were all waiting for — the Library Dedication, itself! The Forum was filled to capacity. Leading the dignitaries to the stage were a Sword bearer and 2 Mace carriers, and of course, our flags. There wee many speeches — perhaps too many and some too long — followed by the actual "dedication". There was a "fly-over" which was most impressive as seen through the glass roof of the Forum. Lunch and personal visits through our Memorial followed.

On to the Banquet! The only venue able to accommodate all 900+ attendees was the Sports Village – some of you may recall that we had had a previous dinner there a few years ago. The dinner, as always, was up to our expectations, and Jordon served as MC. Jordan, as always, did a fine job in spite of sever time restraints.

I would like to add a few words about the area of my responsibility – namely, the Bequest Program. I had the most pleasant task of introducing Mr. Nelson Becker from Montana, who brought with him, his wife and son. Mr. Becker presented to Paul King, representing the Trust, the redemption of his uncle's Pledge. His uncle, Edwin Becker, had pledged \$50,000 to the Capital Fund of the Trust! Edwin Becker folded his wings in May just passed. This is the first Pledge to be redeemed, and we are indebted to Ed. Thank you Edwin Becker, and thank you Nelson, for your help.

I was also involved in concluding the Koorndyk challenge - explained in previous Journals. generosity triggered participation by the groups, and I am pleased to say that all stipulations made by Bud were met. Representing the Bequest Program, I proudly presented to Paul King, a check for another\$50,000! So the Bequest Program, which is a continuing activity, was responsible for increasing the Capital Fund of the Trust by \$100,000! We tore down lanes and through the quiet villages in our trucks and jeeps and roared down the concrete strips, so freshly laid over the used-to-be cow pastures, in our thundering Liberators.

Here is an account of one such group, my group, the 467th Bomb Group-Heavy. We were based in a remote eastern corner of England known as Norfolk in the small village of Rackheath. As you will learn, many were the triumphs and defeats, the joys and the sorrows we shared there. In the reading of it, the story and details are quite accurate. I have very vivid memories of so many of the events depicted here. I truly recommend this book as a gate to the inner problems and feelings of the group, the staff and supervision.

As I have mentioned, many pages have been written about our time at Rackheath but this story is unique. It is written by one who grew up in postwar England and whose background is firmly planted in the Norfolk area. It is, I believe, very appropriate that a story of the 467th be told by one so closely associated with the land and its people. Who better to know and understand how we were perceived! David H. Kibble-White is our narrator. He has done an excellent job in the telling.

I shall never forget that spot in that little corner of Norfolk where so much of my life was lived in such a short space of time. Indeed, so strong were the ties that were made, so profound was our mission, we left feeling akin with each other, the land and its people; such bonds can never be broken!
