2nd ADA - JACK STEVENS

A Legacy - Not Just a Memorial

At the Ex-Com meeting in Philadelphia 25-26 May 2004, the 2nd AD Memorial was reviewed. It has been well received by the people in the Norwich area. Contributions announced at the meeting indicate that the goal of perpetual funding for the Memorial and its Fullbright American Librarian is in sight.

Shortly before WW II ended in Europe, three senior 2nd AD officers proposed to General Kepner a memorial "to and from those who survived to honor those who gave their lives while serving in the 2nd Air Division, 8th Air Force, USAAF, in England during WW II." General Kepner approved the proposal and issued a challenge to make the memorial a "living tribute."

Members of the 2nd AD's fourteen bomb groups, five fighter groups and their assigned and attached units contributed the equivalent of more than \$80,000 which was used to establish a memorial trust, with a Board of Governors of English friends. Over the years, the Trust Governors and the elected officers of the 2nd ADA have stayed in close communication concerning the Memorial, its operations, and its condition.

The 2nd AD Memorial in the Central Library consists of a reading and reference room with an illuminated Roll of Honor of the dead, the 2nd AD flags, unit memorabilia, and a library of American books and

periodicals. It has become a focus of study, research and of mutual respect, admiration, and friendship for people in England and the United States.

Now, after the devastating in 1994, that gutted the Central Library building, a magnificent Forum building has risen, housing an even finer Memorial Library with new state-of-the-art computer equipment which our American Fullbright Librarian has used to help elderly Norwich citizens record their wartime memories and experiences and to maybe bridge a technological gap between them and their children and to communicate with families and with American friends they met during WW II or at 2nd ADA reunions in Norwich and/or cities in the U.S. Like the butterfly, the most beautiful of all insects, which passes through several stages in its life (egg, larva, and pupa) before the beauty of its final adult stager, the 2nd AD Memorial has passed from an idea for a memorial, a tribute to life, and a bonding device for Americans and Friends of the 2nd AD in England - a legacy for future Americans and English.

There is no doubt that your living Memorial to those 7000 friends of yours who lost their lives for Freedom, as well as you who survived, will always be remembered down the ages when people from all over the world visit the Forum in Norwich and the beautiful 2nd Air Division Memorial Library, the only one of its kind.

The Appeal is also going well here in the UK and I know you will be pleased to learn that Bernard Matthews, the owner of one of our leading Norfolk Companies who has always supported the 2nd ADA, has just given £100,000 to your Library - you will never be forgotten.

Had a main Trust Board meeting this week with a very full agenda and the number of visitors just goes on rising. A refurbishment programme starts shortly with completion by November of this year.

At Rackeath the Marker looks fine, the Private Miney Plaque is well cared for as is the bronze plaque under the village sign. I think that the "Coffey Gates" at the Community Centre will need a repaint this year. On the Flags for the Marker we could do with your help. We

have funds for these but the ones we purchase here in the UK are very inferior quality to those made in the USA and are soon blown out. We use 5ft by 3ft and could do with four of each, the Stars & Stripes and the Union Jack - Can anyone help please.

We have just read the draft of the new book by our famous author Flt.Lt John Nichol on the story of Bomber Command in World War.2 both day and night. This is due to be published in November and it one of the best books I have ever read on what it was really like to fly those missions. My thanks to the 2nd ADA for providing John with so much material.

This year the Edwards family organised a "Forties Night" in the Community Centre which featured James Mahoney's unique colour film. It was so heavily oversold that we are having another in the autumn again featuring James Mahoney's film plus the "Roll of Honor".

Finally on Wednesday I was sworn in for my third tour at USAF Mildenhall as Honorary Group Commander and it is so wonderful to have these links with the US Air Force men and women of today.

REPORT AND UPDATE by PERRY WATTS

Regarding the mentioning by Jack Stevens in the April edition (Spring 2004) of the Second Air Division Association Journal that I make a model B-24 for display in the Air Museum at Lackland Air Base. By the end of this week a 1/144th scale model of B-24J - 1 FO 42-50675 "Bold Venture III" - that served with the 788th Squadron of the 467th B/Group will be air mailed over to the museum and will be accompanied by a brief history on the aircraft. I wish it could have been a 1/72nd scale model but I very much doubt whether such a larger scale model would survive the postal transportation and arrive complete!

Further news on my book on the history of the 467th Bombardment Group. The manuscript and a large number of photographs were shipped over to The Schiffer Publishing Company at Atglen, Pennsylvania early last March and I recently received a communication from the editor stating that the book should hopefully be printed and become available sometime in December.

Updated news on the Control Tower at Rackheath. On the 21 June I had a very interesting meeting with Mr. Ben MacIntosh, a director with the company that are now the owners of the Control Tower building and surrounding site. Mr. MacIntosh informed me that to date Aqua Fibre (the company that purchased the Tower from the scrap metal merchant Mr. Bagshaw) has completely cleared the site and completely emptied the building of all junk. Additionally the company has installed drainage. electricity and laid on mains water supply to the site. A new metal fencing about seven feet high has also been erected around the Tower area. The original and damaged asbestos rainwater guttering and downpipes that were fitted to the Tower when it was built in 1942/43 have been replaced by new plastic material guttering and pipes. Mr. MacIntosh informed me having carried out this work some vandalism recently occurred and one of the drainage downpipes has been smashed and part of the metal fencing pulled down, also the vandals entered the Tower and ripped out and bent or twisted several of the original "Crittal" metal window frames albeit the window frames were rusted through and corroded to the stage of being beyond repair or restoration for reuse, but by ripping some of the frames out could or may have caused some further damage to the brickwork surrounding the window openings. Mr. MacIntosh also emphasized that the Tower restoration cost will amount to a substantial sum of money and I gathered that the company are not over anxious to freely spend a lot of money on the building without having some immediate use for it - and may possibly become the Aqua Fibre company office at some point in the future. When I enquired if he could give some indication as to an approximate date when the restoration of the Tower was likely to be completed I was informed that it would not be before the end of the year 2005, unless Aqua Fibre were approached by a company who wished to lease the building in the reasonably near future as an office or suchlike and then under those circumstances the restoration of the building would certainly be speeded up. I informed Mr. MacIntosh that when the Tower is fully restored I am willing to personally donate a number of copy photographs and paintings relating to the 467th Group for display in one small room in the Tower set aside for such purpose and dedicated to the 467th Group. Finally, Mr. MacIntosh did ask me if there are any establishments/organizations such as heritage funding that could provide some financial grant towards the cost of restoring the Control Tower.

Finally my best wishes to you all and hoping to see many of you at the 467th Group Convention at Northern Kentucky in October.

IN MEMORIAM

DR. RICHARD L. RIDER passed away November 17, 2003 at his home in Pittsburg, Kansas. He was born on August 9, 1915 in Council Bluffs, Iowa, and graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1937. He served in the Iowa and Nebraska Army National Guard from 1934 through 1938. He was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Infantry upon completion of ROTC training and graduation from the Univ. of Nebraska. He joined the Active Army in October 1940 and attended flight school in February 1941.

He flew many types of aircraft and was stationed in Puerto Rico with the 4h Observation Sqd, at Wendover Field, Utah with the 789th Bomb Squadron; and as Squadron Commander at Mt. Home AAB, Idaho and Orlando, Florida with the 467~ Bomb Group (Heavy). In 1944 he was transferred to the European Theater and was assigned to the 461~ Bomb Group as an Air Inspector and Operations Officer. He flew many combat missions over Europe. These included missions over Rome, Arno, the Balkans, the Po Valley, Northern and Southern France, Normandy, North Apennies, and Germany. He was honorably discharged from the Army Air Corps on 1 December 1945 with the rank of Major.

After service in World War II he returned to further his education and received his Masters and Doctorate Degrees. He worked as a University Professor and Department Chairman at many school including the University of Illinois; University of Warrnambool, Victoria, Australia; University of Papua New Guinea; and the University of Hawaii. He also spent some time with the U.S. Agency for International Development in Lagos, Nigeria. In retirement he continued as a part-time Professor for Community Colleges and with the U.S. Navy's PACE Program.

His wife of over 50-years, MRS. ADA W. RIDER, died 5 weeks after her husband on December 24, 2003 in Pittsburg, Kansas.

Dr. And Mrs. Rider are survived by their children: Mrs. Josephine Garcia of Florida; Dr. Virginia Rider-Swafford of Pittsburg, Kansas, Dr. Ward Rider of Kailua, Hawaii; Mr. Richard L. Rider, Jr. of Kansas City, Missouri; and three grand children.

Even in death Dr. and Mrs. Rider continue to contribute to education. Both of them donated their bodies to the School of Medicine, University of Missouri, Kansas City.

Editors Note: Many of you have asked about Puff and I thought this note from Anne was the best way to let you know about him and possibly why they have not been to recent conventions. Speaking of Puff, I also had the following note as a memory from Lyle Prichard which had me laughing all the way through.

LYLE PRICHARD

After we were done flying we had to give up our place in our hut to move to one a couple hundred yards away next to the "ground pounders" area. Nice fellows, but we didn't have all that much in common. Lt. Delbert T. Been's cot was on the left side of the rear door and mine was on the right side. I kept my 45 caliber pistol hanging on a peg and his was in his foot locker which he slid under his cot. Floyd J. (Puff) Pugh came to visit as he was through flying and had to move near us. Been had been in the Cavalry before and was always expounding the virtues of the Cavalry, also what a good shot he was. Puff and I told him he was blowing smoke and he couldn't hit a bull in the rearend with a banjo. Been sat humming the WWII song "Paper Doll" as he slowly slid his footlocker from under his cot, opened the top and took out a vanilla envelope. contained paper doll cutouts and clothes which he would dress as he hummed the tune. He very methodically put the dolls and envelope back and slid his 45 out of the holster, cocked a round into the chamber, pointed it out the rear door of our hut and squeezed off three rounds into the chimney of the hut next door. These chimneys consisted of a cast iron pipe that came up through the roof from that infernal coke stove inside. It was enveloped on the outside by a galvanized pipe with a little rain cap on the top of it. These 45 caliber slugs went through the outside pipe hit the cast iron pipe, putting a hole in it, they ricocheted around inside breaking more holes until the cast iron broke off and fell over inside with a thump. Between the sound of the gun going off and the bullets breaking the cast iron pipe and it falling on the cement floor inside it, the occupants of the hut were greatly disturbed and beat a hasty retreat outside! The one we saw was a rather chubby short man who was an Intelligence Officer of the Group. These men worked a lot during the night time hours preparing the briefings and slept quite a lot during the day. He was awakened by the ensuing commotion and bolted out the rear door of his hut hair flying, bugeyed, hand over one ear and bellowing like a gut shot dog! I might also say he was dressed only in a pair of socks and his G.I. shorts and was slightly bow legged. Been had hastily stowed his 45 back in the holster, closed the lid of the foot locker and slid it back under his cot. When this guy got near our hut he hallored "did you hear all that shooting?" Of course the three of us sat there asking "What shooting?" We said that we hadn't heard a thing even though the air was permeated with the smell of cordite. Nothing ever came of this episode.
