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
President's Message



OTHER ITEMS: Anthony Seymour of Colleague Software Ltd. the inhabitants of the Rackheath Control Tower, contacted to say the upper floor of the Tower was undergoing building-work to make it a large open-plan office environment. An internal wall was taken down using nearly 1 tonne of steel to support the roof. The builders said they had never taken a wall down like this.....they chose the hottest day of the year to do it as well. 91F.!!

The GREEN MAN PUB at Rackheath has re-opened after an 18 month period of closure. The Pub was particularly popular with Officers from the 467th during WWII so good news to have it back in business. After a degree of refurbishment it was disappointing to see previous items of 467th BG "memorabilia" including several paintings were no longer on display, but hopefully numerous representations to the new owners may see a return of links to the past.

Ross Rainwater wrote about an interesting discovery from his late brother's belongings which formerly belonged to his Father - "a pair of B-24 Keys". Ross's Father was T/Sgt. Roy L. Rainwater, Engineer on the 790th Squadron Lt. Elroy Beaney, Crew#70, one of the original air echelon to reach Rackheath in March 1944. The Crew departed Wendover, UT., 15th February 1944 and after a stop at Herington, KS., for final inspections and last practise missions, took the long Southern Atlantic ferry-route to destination, Rackheath, England. A brand new olive-drab B24H manufactured by

Consolidated at Fort Worth, **41-29404** was issued to the crew and carried them without mishap reaching the St. Mawgan base in the southwest of England. Departing early on the 20th March for the 375 mile trip completing the final transition from the U.S. to England, the flight ended abruptly and certainly unplanned. Probably due to unfamiliarity, Lt. Beaney chose in error to land on the short runway at Rackheath, and downwind. Excessive heavy use of the brakes caused the nose-wheel to collapse with the brand new B24 left nose-down in an unceremonious arrival at the new base. Fortunately the crew suffered no injuries but the B24 was written-off in the accident and salvaged the following days.

Pictured are those keys belonging to the brand new B24 #404 that Engineer of the Crew, T/Sgt. Roy Rainwater had managed to retain following completing 35 combat missions and returning safely to the U.S. Next task was to learn how and where the pair of keys were used on a B24 which led Ross to enquire with the Mighty Eighth Heritage Museum at Savannah. Experts responded with the following comprehensive explanation: *The keys fit two identical locks, one on the rear crew entry hatch in the floor of the aircraft near the tail. The other was a lockable panel in the fuselage, just ahead of the bomb bays. This panel gave access to a hydraulic utility valve, which when operated, opened the bomb doors.*

I would imagine the flight engineer or pilot would normally hold a key and probably the crew chief too. Having said that, I'm pretty sure that on the base in the UK the aircraft would not be locked, to allow any of the armament specialists, or airframe mechanics etc access to the aircraft at any time without having



to search out the right guy holding the key. There was security at the bases anyway so it wasn't necessary to keep the aircraft locked. I think the keys would have been used if the aircraft was parked at an unsecure base when it was en route for a ferry flight for example. I also checked the serial of this particular aircraft and saw that it was built as a B-24H-15 by Consolidated at Fort Worth with constructor's number 503 sometime between August 1943 and April 1944 but probably around the end of 1943 or early 1944.

Ross concludes: The explanation of where/when/why the keys (both identical) were used reflects the reality that during the Southern Route, there would have been a likely need to secure the aircraft at each of the temporary stopovers. My dad was the Flight Engineer and I know from the stories he told that he took the inherent responsibilities of that position *very* seriously. His 35 combat missions speak to that dedication and expertise, as well as that of his fellow crew.



David Hastings provided the interesting photo (left) taken we think during the late 90's. Not exactly sure of the date but it was the last visit by **Colonel Shower**. The link was that after the war one of the huts from Rackheath was taken to RAF Neatishead for use as the Combined Mess and the 467th gave a plaque to hang in the Bar to mark the event. When the new Mess at Neatishead was built and the old hut removed it was decided that the 467th would plant a tree on the site to serve as a reminder of those links. That link also featured on the Trust film "A Village Remembers".

(RAF Neatishead was an important part of the UK's secret radar system during WWII providing early warning and detection. It's work carried on during the "Cold War" years and still has a role today providing ground-to-air radio and data links in support of NATO and national air defence. The site also houses the RAF Air Defence Radar Museum. See http://www.radarmuseum.co.uk/)




Owen K. Ball, Administration Section 492nd & 788th Sq. 467th BG

Owen Keith Ball passed away on April 25, 2014, of natural causes. He was 98 years old. Mr. Ball was born in Edmonton, KY, in 1916, grew up in Cookeville, TN, and graduated from the University of Missouri in 1941 with a bachelor's degree in journalism. After service with the US Army Air Force in WWII, he married Martha Katherine Ball of Bean's Creek, TN, in 1946, and worked for the Louisville (KY) Courier-Journal (1946-1950), the Binghamton (NY) Press (1950-1951), and the Miami (FL) News (1951-1963). Mr. Ball was Managing Editor of the Miami News from 1961-1963, when the paper's reporting earned the 1963 Pulitzer Prize for International Reporting for stories revealing that the Soviet Union was installing missile launching pads and basing large numbers of MIG-21 aircraft in Cuba, which led ultimately to the 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis. Mr. and Mrs. Ball purchased the Evergreen, CO, weekly newspaper Canyon Courier in 1963 and published it until their retirement in 1974. They remained lifelong residents of Evergreen. Mrs. Ball passed way in 2006 after a long illness.

Born in Norwich in the 1930's, Mike watched the increasing air activity in his native skies as the number of airfields increased around him during World War II. As a schoolboy he watched the activities with fascination at Horsham St. Faith, his local airfield. He became immensely attached to the 458th Bomb Group and the B-24 Liberators which were based there, this aircraft became his favorite which led to an active support for the Second Air Division of the 8th Air Force and his subsequent contributions to their history can be seen today in the Memorial Library in Norwich.

In addition to Mike's work for authors and publishers he has carried out many private painting commissions for individuals, including a number for members of the 467th, relatives, and associates. Mike has lost count the number of times he has painted versions of the 467th's "Witchcraft" and one of my personal favorites of the legendary aircraft currently resides in the restored Control Tower at Rackheath.

Mike recalls from a very early age having a pencil in his hand but never received formal training or attended any art schools. When World War II began in September 1939 aeroplanes, and lots of them, were a constant sight and sound over the Norwich home. To most young boys of that period aircraft were the most exciting objects in existence and most were proud of their aircraft recognition skills.

The sight of the Luftwaffe streaking across the city and sometimes unloading its lethal cargo over Norwich during hit and run raids made a lasting impact. It

was as a witness to these scenes that Mike first began pencil sketches often showing RAF planes downing the German bombers by the score. One particular night the Luftwaffe hit Norwich with a vengeance and Mike recalls just managing to scramble into the shelter with his mum seconds before some bombs landed very close by with shattering effect. Next morning they emerged from the shelter to an unrecognisable scene with the houses adjacent a pile of rubble. Many people had died that night including a close school friend of Mike's. Mike's home was still standing, albeit without windows, doors or roof tiles so Mike and his mum moved in with relatives until the house could be made basically habitable.

In the early summer of 1943 Mike recalls the entire 56th Fighter Group arriving to land at Horsham. A never to be forgotten sight as their P-47 Thunderbolts presented another challenge for pencil and drawing pad. However their stay was short-lived and soon the airfield was closed for the laying of hard surface runways in place of grass and in early 1944 the 458th Bomb Group arrived with its B-24 Liberator bombers.


Regular hikes out to Horsham St. Faith occurred in the hope of getting close up views of Liberators. Persistence was eventually rewarded after crossing numerous farmers fields Mike got close to a dispersal area and right in among the parked B-24s. Ground crews were working on the engines and much to Mike's amazement they were greeted cheerfully and allowed to climb through some of the Liberators. This was almost too good to be true and from then on Mike returned with pals every possible opportunity at weekends and school holidays. Mike was often at hand when missions returned with battle-damaged aircraft and the whole experience made a deep and lasting impression. Drawing pads were now filled with images of B-24s and on subsequent visits Mike would carefully inspect the aircraft at close quarters to include what had been noted in sketches upon return home.

With the end of the war in Europe and the 458th and other bomb groups left to return to the U.S. people rejoiced at the end of hostilities and life returned to something like normal with the return of Mike's dad who had survived D-Day and the subsequent fighting across Europe and into Germany.

Mike left school at 15 and went to work at a large printing company but the hope of an apprenticeship as a lithographic artist did not materialize immediately forcing Mike into another branch of the printing trade. For a period Mike drifted away from art and the next significant event was national service. Upon completion of basic training Mike volunteered for active service abroad. This took him to the Suez Canal Zone in the early 50's with searing heat, dysentery, sandstorms, constant guard duties and hatred directed at them from the local population.

Returning home upon demob Mike married Maureen in 1960 and it was back to the job in the printing industry, although with little enthusiasm for the work. About this time Mike and Maureen developed an interest in foreign travel and through an intermediary regenerated an interest in aviation and aviation in general. The interest grew with purchase of many books and visits to specialist aviation bookshops in London and frequent visits to view the photographic collection at the Imperial War Museum.




Mike turned out the occasional painting and was pleasantly surprised to find people offering to purchase his work. In the early 1970's Mike's work was published for the first time when he cooperated with the late Roger Freeman in illustrating a series of booklets entitled *Aircraft Camouflage and Markings of the U.S.A.A.F.* More work followed and over the years has produced profile views and dust jacket illustrations for various publications. In 1974 Mike presented a painting of a Liberator to the Second Air Division Memorial Library in Norwich and as a result recommended for honorary life membership of the association. This bought Mike into contact with many veterans who flew B-24s from East Anglia some 30 years previous and found himself accepting commissions to produce individual Liberators for many. With the creation of the new Second Air Division Memorial Room in Norwich Mike produced a series of Liberator profile views with all 14 bomb groups represented. A very successful poster was made of Mike's work called *Combat Colours* reflecting the different markings of all 14 bomb groups making up the Second Air Division and is highly sought after today.

Early retirement opportunity in 1995 allowed Mike to concentrate on his true love and vocation the painting of aircraft and particularly B-24s. In 2007 saw the publication of the very worthy *The Aviation Art of Mike Bailey* featuring over 40 different aircraft examples with the B-24 well represented though out. The B-24 is the only aircraft Mike does not require a photo when painting, he says with a smile and glint in his eye when I had the pleasure of collecting my own cherished commission of the 790th Squadron, B-24 "Angel" completed at the end of 2012.

He enjoys a challenge painting today and has developed a liking for portraying aircraft types from pre-world war II. It is getting the struts and wires illustrated correctly in some of those less renowned types that makes it worthwhile says Mike. Surprisingly, Mike is his own harshest critic and remarks, "I've yet to complete one that satisfies me. All I can see is the parts where it could be improved". Those familiar with Mike's work have frequently commented on the attention to detail and fastidious accuracy of colours, markings, right down to the last rivet. His aviation paintings are a real joy and pleasure to behold, more so when you appreciate the very special connection established as a youthful witness to those graphic scenes in the skies over East Anglia 70 years ago.
