# President's Message

Between planning for our tip to Norwich in May, and the campaign to put a very special memorial at Wendover Army Air Field in Utah, two committees have been very busy, but both efforts are moving well enough to grab a cup of coffee and assess 'where we are.' The consensus of your directors is that The Association is strong and healthy enough to fulfil its mission in meaningful ways, while the sense of accomplishment keeps us looking for tomorrow's next way to honor and remember the 467th BG (H) of WWII.

We slightly scaled back the size of the 'scratch-built' B-24, lowering the cost, so that our goal is now 70% achieved. Artist-builder Guillermo will soon lay down the keel for a 1:20 scale H model that is to be richly detailed as "Witchcraft" on the pilot's side, and will be seen from co-pilot's side as "Scrapper". If you have not already donated in memory of a deceased person or group of persons, or in honor of a living one, you still have the opportunity. If you know of people whose vet served on the same crew or staff or technical team or ground crew as 'your veteran,' please think in terms of 'group gifts.' We already have a few such gifts and will be contacting many of you, reminding you of ways you are historically connected to others, and hope you will come up with others.

Donations exceeding \$5000 will be called out in detail at the 'Albert J. Shower Level' on a special wall plaque nearby. Gifts from \$1000 to \$4,999—the 'Witchcraft Level'— and 'Pilot Level' contributions (\$500-\$999) will be listed on the plaque with less detail, and *all* donors and their honorees will be recorded in a nearby book which will present information on 467th BG men killed in line of duty during training or on the way from Wendover, to Rackheath.

Even if you are not writing your check (or using PayPal) today, we would like to hear from you as soon as possible with a pledge, to be made good between now and the last day of 2020. Some of us have set up regular installment payments; you can too.

Return to Norwich 2020: your reunion committee is setting up short walks or rides in WW II jeeps for deeper explorations into remnants of housing and airfield sites and locations of specific hardstands. We hope to gain entrance to Sir Edward Stracey's Rackheath Hall and pass through the now-restored 'Golden Gates' that led to exceptional temporary home of the 467th BG.

Whether you have previously visited USAAF Station #145, or only dreamed of walking the ground where your veteran lived and worked, this is likely *the last time* you will be able to see the substantial airfield area from the refurbished tower. As soon as this fall, we anticipate ground-breaking for a housing development which will obliterate this iconic view *for all time*. Be there!

**<u>DEPARTED FRIENDS</u>**: Sad to learn of the passing of three distinguished 467th veterans in recent months who all were past attendees at our annual reunions, active in the former 2nd Air Division Association, or similarly a presence with the



local Eighth Air Force Historical Society Chapters. ED GORE, former navigator with the 789th Edward King Crew and a regular aboard the B24J "MASSILLON TIGER" was always a pleasure to meet along with the others of Crew#46. Likewise, HARRY TANZER, radio-operator with the 788th Norman Felbinger Crew, who would bring along a number of display boards presenting all sorts of memorabilia collected during his Army Air Force days at Rackheath and during training at radio and gunnery school. Harry did not like to throw anything away! You may have bumped into him at the Palm Springs Air Museum in recent years. "HANK" WEDAA, was one of those illustrious original 467th who were there at the very beginning, undergoing training with the fledgling Group at Wendover Army Air Base, UT. Hank was a bombardier with the 791st William Graf Crew and part of the original air echelon who arrived Rackheath in March 1944. He also had the distinction of participating in the historic first combat mission of the 467th BG with the Graf Crew on 10 April 1944. Especially active in rhe local community, Hank would host evening "Talks" where he was ever keen to recall his military experiences of

# WENDOVER FUND RAISER PROJECT

### IMPORTANT UPDATE

The 467th BG Association is honored and excited to announce the commissioning of a scale model of a B-24(H) to be displayed in the museum at the air base at Wendover, UT. The model will be part of a more extensive display commemorating the historic 467th. We hope to particularly draw attention to the many men killed during training and transit to England.


The artist for this project, Guillermo Rojas Bazan, has hand-built beautiful "works of aviation art" for 40 years, depicting many period aircraft. They are highly detailed and accurate, built from scratch out of aluminum. We had originally planned a scale of 1:16 for this project, but given some spatial and weight considerations, we have opted for a slightly smaller scale of 1:20.

With a wingspan of over five feet this will make an amazing display piece. With the smaller scale, our goal is now \$52,000. With over \$36,000 in donations and pledges, we are now 70% of the way to our goal. Please consider being part of this wonderful event, honoring the men of the 467th.

We have chosen two planes to be honored. Both of them were original aircraft that were assigned to the Group while stationed at Wendover AAB in early 1944. The first aircraft to be honored is 42-52534 'Witchcraft'. The decision for this one was easy: her 130 missions without an abort is a record for the entire 8th Air Force in WWII. In all of those missions, not a single crewman was even slightly injured!

**NEW TARGET: \$52,000** 



The second aircraft to be honored is 42-52394 'Palace Meat Market/Scrapper'. 'Scrapper' had the sole distinction of taking part on the Group's first and last combat missions. She also had the distinction of being assigned to each of the 467th BG's four bomb squadrons. With nearly one hundred flown combat missions to her credit, her combat record is very impressive. 'Witchcraft' will be depicted on the pilot's side of the aircraft, while 'Scrapper' will be depicted on the co-pilot's side. The markings for both aircraft will be shown as they were at the end of hostilities.

The model will be configured as if in flight, suspended from the ceiling for dramatic effect. The process of building the model should take about one year. We are hoping to have a dedication ceremony in 2021 during our annual Association reunion. We will have periodic progress updates from Guillermo. Please check our Facebook page for construction updates and campaign progress.



### Story of the Rackheath Landmark


Called the "Golden Gates" because they were once painted gold. They were made by Cottam and Hallen, of Winsley Street, London and exhibited at the Grat Exhibition of 1851 at Crystal Palace. They were subsequently purchased and installed at Rackheath when the entrance lodges were built at the junction of the Wroxham Road leading into Rackheath Park in approximately 1886.

Prior to the arrival of the 467th low brick walls and brick piers were built either side of the gates in order to prevent possible vehicle damage. It appears the gates themselves were removed possibly because they were deteriorating or more likely it would make the opening much wider. It now remains a mystery as to what happened to them.

All 467th personnel leaving their domestic quarters situated in the grounds of Rackheath Park would have passed through these famous gates to catch the Liberty Bus to Norwich just 5 miles away.

Post war the structure consistently fell into disrepair and serious dilapidation, to the extent that by 2002 Broadland Building Preservation Trust took them on as a project with a view to restoring them. Vulnerable pieces were removed and put into storage with DGT Structures, in Lenwade north west of Norwich, for safekeeping. For approximately 10 years the Trust tried to raise the estimated £100K to completely restore the structure.

Unfortunately all of the endeavors of the Trust were to no avail and the Trust folded in 2015. It was subsequently found that the vulnerable pieces that had been put into storage for safekeeping had been lost. For a time it was thought that what was left of the structure was in such poor condition and somewhat of a safety hazard that it should be entirely removed. However as it had been given a Grade II listed status in 1982 it was protected by its listing.

Finally in February 2019 a detailed planning application was made to Broadland District Council to repair and restore what remains of the structure. The application was granted and the required restoration was immediately put into effect.

Each section in turn was photographed and labeled and removed from site to a Blacksmith's workshop where all the necessary repairs and restoration were carried out. Subsequently towards the end of 2019 all items were returned to site and reinstalled to the entrance of Rackheath Park.

The accompanying photographs bear witness to the skill of the Craftsmen of the 1850s, the restoration skills of today's Blacksmith and a permanent reminder of all personnel of the 467<sup>th</sup> who knew it and identified with it.

### Site#6, Community Wood Project: by Ivan Barnard

Since the last POOP Newsletter, Norfolk County Council have become involved with the project and are now actively assisting Broadland District Council with the implementation phase of the works. One aspect of this collaborative arrangement has been the completion of an ecology report, which now enables the tree management works to proceed. I was invited by Norfolk County Council to attend a project presentation that they gave to the Planning Committee of Rackheath Parish Council.

I was also given permission to scan the site for possible 467<sup>th</sup> artifacts left buried under seventy years of leaf-mould. The most interesting find so far is an 18inch aluminum cut-out of a B24. It was found buried midway alongside the footpath from Col. Albert J. Shower's domestic quarters and the Sword and Chain Officers Club. So it's just possible that it once adorned the wall of one of these buildings.

I have also had confirmation from Norfolk County Council's Lead Project Officer that the various Contractors required have all been appointed. Therefore the onsite works are about to start and be completed for the May visit of the 467<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group Association. The six interpretation boards are ready and they shall be strategically positioned throughout the pathways. They will depict and illustrate the use of the former site by the 467<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group.

# **Obituaries**



#### Edward F. Gore, Navigator, 789th

Edward Francis Gore passed away peacefully on November 12, 2019 with his loving wife of 70 years by his side. Mr. Gore's 94-year life was defined by his lifelong devotion to his wife, Elizabeth Daisley Gore, his family, and his Catholic faith. Born in Rosedale, Queens New York to Charles and Bertha Gore(vic) on February 28, 1925, Edward was the second of four sons. Mr. Gore's spirit of devotion began prior to his teenage years, as he helped support his family during the Great Depression by delivering food via bicycle.

Upon the United States entry into World War II, Mr. Gore proudly enlisted in the Army Air Force and successfully trained as part of the Class of 44-9 Advanced Navigators at Ellington Field in Texas. He graduated as a First Lieutenant and was assigned to the 8th Air Force, Combat 467th Bomb Group, and 789th Squadron, based at Rackheath Air Base in England. There he served as a Navigator on the B-24 Liberator 'Massillon Tiger', participating in 31 missions from 12/2/1944 through 4/21/1945, until returning on 6/11/1945 after the successful liberation of Europe. For the rest of his life, he was grateful for the country he was able to serve.

After returning from the war, the G.I. Bill allowed him to attend the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn NY, where he earned a B.S. in Civil Engineering in 1949. It was there that a Phi Kappa Phi fraternity brother arranged a blind double date with himself, his fianc, Mr. Gore, and his fiancs sister, Betty. Betty is the love of Mr. Gores life. After their marriage in 1949, and several engineering jobs involving building the NYC water supply tunnel in Liberty, NY and a power plant in Perth Amboy, NJ, they settled in Roselle, NJ, where they started and raised a family.

At that time, he joined Robbins Construction Company of Union, NJ, where had a successful career first as their Chief Estimator then eventually as President then Owner of the firm, until his retirement in 1984. He was politically active in Roselle, successfully elected as Councilman in 1968 and holding the role until 1971. He participated on the parish council at St. Josephs in Roselle, was a member of the Knight of Columbus and the Republican Committee of Roselle, and supported innumerable community, civic, and charitable organizations.

Many happy summers, from 1964 through 1982, were spent at their summer home in Barnegat Light, NJ, where their family created a lifetime of treasured memories. Upon his retirement, he became a 35-year member of Suburban Golf Club in Union, NJ, golfing actively into his 90s. He also enjoyed traveling with his wife, gardening, supporting the NY Yankees and NY Giants, and creating countless wonderful memories with and for all of his grandchildren as the proud host of numerous annual holiday gatherings.



#### Harry Tanzer, Radio-operator, 788th

Harry Tanzer, a 60-year resident of California, died Sept. 4, 2018, at the age of 93. The son of Paul and Sarah Tanzer, he was born Nov. 10, 1924 in Holyoke, Massachusetts. Mr. Tanzer performed faithful service to his country in the U.S. Air Force. He was a senior radio operator and gunnery technical sergeant in World War II from 1942 to 1945 and in the Korean War from 1951 to 1952.

Mr. Tanzer was a Met Life salesman and a schoolteacher before his eventual retirement. He was a member of the Lions and Masons, was an avid ham radio operator, organized and

officiated Back to School Night in Yucca Valley and was a member of the Palm Springs Air Museum and a Friend of the Library.

Harry was a loving and caring father and friend. He was always willing to help anywhere, anytime. He loved hanging out at the Palm Springs Air Museum. He stayed very active in keeping the spirit of freedom alive without judgment or prejudice. His stories were always informative and the love he had in his heart for his country could not be measured by any words.




#### Henry "Hank" W. Wedaa, Bombardier, 791st

Henry "Hank" Wedaa was a loving family man whose professional life was characterized by an unending passion for environmental, social and technical issues that manifested itself in a career of public service. Hank was born on February 15th, 1924, to Henrik and Anna Wedaa, in Atlantic City, New Jersey, at 18, Hank enlisted in the Army Air Force, where he was trained as a bombardier and aerial gunner, reaching the rank of First Lieutenant in the 8th Air Force, 467th Bombardment Group. Hank flew 30 missions over Northern Europe in his crew's B-24, earning the Distinguished Flying Cross and Air Medal with 3 Oak Leaf Clusters. After returning from Northern Europe in early July, 1944, his fighting days were over. He was then transferred to Clovis, New Mexico, where he served as a bombardier instructor. He was bored at this job, so he volunteered to be on the B-29 crew for training missions until the war ended. At the conclusion of the war, Hank was

honorably discharged. In November, 1945, he married Frances Bukey of Tucson, Arizona. Their marriage ended in divorce in 1978. Hank graduated from Gettysburg College, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, in 1949, majoring in physics and chemistry. He then attended the University of Arizona Graduate School where he majored in physics. After leaving Graduate School, he was employed at the U.S. Naval Weapons Center, China Lake, California for eight years. During this period, he was promoted to Captain of the U.S. Air Force Reserve. It was the establishment of new, Northrop offices in Anaheim, California, that provided the serendipitous opportunity of finding a final home in the city of Yorba Linda, where Hank raised his family and dedicated himself as an elected representative to his nascent communities' development for 48 years. During his 30 years as an elected official, he served as President of Southern California's Association of Government's and Chairman of the Governing Board of South Coast Air Quality Management District. When he left the Board in 1996, they gave him the new title of Chairman Emeritus. He was one of the founders of the California Hydrogen Business Council and was a major factor in the willingness of the District to spend money in accelerating the development of hydrogen fuel cells. Among his many awards, two are significant they are the State of California's Air Resources Board's Haagen Smit Clean Air Award and the National Fuel Cell Seminar Award for his leadership in accelerating the future of hydrogen vehicles and clean, stationary power sources. In 1970, Hank was elected to the Yorba Linda City Council where he served for 30 years, five of which were as mayor. He also founded California School Book Fairs, a traveling company that sold books to school children. In 1995, he sold the business to Scholastic, Inc. Hank was a survivor of bladder cancer and lived with Parkinson's disease for more than 15 years.

**RECOMMENDED TRAVEL TO NORWICH:** Simplest way is to arrange transatlantic flights to AMSTERDAM, then make a short connection flight of just 50mins to NORWICH. Dutch airline KLM has four connecting flights each day and is in alliance with Delta Airlines in the U.S. From Norwich Airport to the Maids Head is a taxi journey of just 15 mins and price depending on time of day £10-15. Folk considering flying into London Heathrow or Gatwick should be aware getting to Norwich in one go is not recommended. Options would be a hire-car and a three hour drive, alternatively spend time in London before taking a 2 hour train journey from Liverpool St. Station to Norwich. There are frequent trains in both directions.

<u>TUESDAY</u>, <u>MAY 5 Arrivals</u>: Check-in, collect welcome/information-pack and meet and greet with friends. Evening meal (on your own) at the Maids Head or choice of many pubs/restaurants in the close vicinity.

Prayers and words from Rev. Darleen Plattin atop the Tower; view the former airfield site and opportunity for reflection. Depart Tower for evening at Salhouse Lodge for meal (on your own) and "live" music along with invited local "friends of the 467th".
