Jackie and I checked in on Tuesday, the 8th. I met all day Wednesday with the Executive Committee. Many good things will come out of these meetings. The 2ADA is in excellent financial condition according to Treasurer Dean Moyer and confirmed by Vince LaRussa's Audit Committee. Evelyn Cohen reported on Norwich '87 and told us that everything is shaping up for a grand and glorious convention. Every effort is being made to accommodate all who wish to attend but it appears she has peaked out on suitable housing at about 900 total. We will be able to give more information in the December issue of POOP. The accommodations are presently oversubscribed, but a possibility if you wish to attend is to provide your own accommodations and arrange through Evelyn to participate in the activites.

The executive Committee meetings and decisions were fully covered in the Association Business Meeting on Saturday. If you have specific questions of the policies and procedures of the Association, write me and I will be glad to tell you of them.

The 467th had the largest of the Group Hospitality Rooms, the Hayloft, which was a great success. And we had the largest of the rooms because I believe we had the largest Group attendance, and were paired with the 492nd BG to which a lot of us were assigned before joining the 467th. The dates were chosen to cause no interference with 2ADA convention in Norwich in May, 1987 and a respite time away for those who will go to England and beyond. It is a little over a year away as you read this, plenty of time to make your plans. I don't want to have one person say "it interferes with plans we have already made." NO EXCUSES.

ROCKETS OVER EAST ANGLIA

Following up the POOP 5-2 article on the German V-2, I received this sidelight by Tommy

Dungar in his recent letter to me.

"Now about those V-2s, I have been in touch with Bob Collins many times telling him about them. I am one of the few people who has seen the start and finsh of one of these, then very secret weapons. I started work in 1943 at A. R. Taylor Timber Merchants at Wroxham. They had about ten acres of land full of large stacks of Government Controlled Ministry of Public Timber Stock from Canada and the U.S.A. In fact, they used to send 3 x 3 hardwood to most of the Air Bases for stacking between the Bombs at the bomb dumps and I have helped to load a truck from Rackheath and Horsham St. Faith many times. Most of this timberstock came by railroad, and a complete goods train of rail trucks full of timber would be shunted into Wroxham Station for us to unload and stack. Well, during September and October 1944 if the conditions were right, from Wroxham Goods Yard looking towards Great Yarmouth you could see two bright golden wavery lines going straight up when one of these rockets was fired. The V-2 which fell near Rackheath on September 29, 1944 at about 5:30 p.m. was the one I saw the finish of. I finished work at 5:00 o'clock and rode my bicycle from Wroxham and was almost as far as the Greenman Pub when I noticed this B-24 from a strange Group, with a yellow and black tail marking, trying to land and firing red flares, and as the planes were part of life then, I stopped with one foot on the bank to watch him land. Then there was this strange rush of air, just like a large flock of birds. I looked up and just for a fraction of a second saw this vivid, greyish, large dart-shaped object hurtle down to earth, a very loud explosion, and the next thing I knew I was in the ditch with the old bike on top of me. I got up, straightened the handlebars and rode in the direction of the bang. It had landed in an area known locally as Mud Corner. Only a few local people knew just how lucky Rackheath was that day, as it was only about one-fourth of a mile away from the Base Bomb Dump. WOW!"

Tommy sent a sketch map of the impact area in relation to the base and bomb dump and this V-2 did hit very close. Looked in my diary and Form 5 and find I was on a gasoline "trucking" mission that date. In any event, I had no prior knowledge of how close a V-2 had come to hitting Rackheath until I read the above from

PLANE'S NAMES

Listed below are 97 aircraft names that I have accumulated in the last 5 - 6

years from your letters, from photos, from lists sent me, principally those of Ray Betcher, Tony North, R. J. Rambosky and Al Welters.

Some of the names are spelled more than one way, in some cases aircraft had successive names—the first being discarded, possibly one had a different name on each side of the nose. The / means I have been given more than one name for the same serial number or different spellings for the same serial number. sure if the THE is proper in all cases.

Look over the list. If you can add to or tell me I should delete from the list, drop me a line. If you can put a serial number or three—digit buzz number with the name, let me know, I have a great many but not all of them.

After a time, when I've heard from you, I'll try to match these names to the 128 aircraft serial numbers of planes I believe were assigned to the 467th, and in the future publish the whole of it with model, lot and manufacturer, squadron assignments, call sign letter, disposition of A/C up to June 12, 1945 and whatever other miscellaneous information that we can get together and publish in tabular form.

As to the serial numbers of aircraft, someone out there has the serial numbers of the A/C flown over to England. I know not all were group planes, some were only being ferried, but if you have such a list, please send it along. have a listing of those flown back to the ZI.

Please let me hear from you on this. I would like to settle at least this issue before we can no longer contribute to this vital research endeavor.

# Bomber's Crew-Meets Again, 41 Years After Last Landing

City Man's Efforts Lead to Reunion of World War II Friends

Because he hadn't seen them in more than 40 years, Doyle Courington thought it was high time he tracked down some old friends.

And recently, after two years of searching, Courington found his nine B-24 crewmates from World War II along with the commander of their 8th Air Force bomb group. They all met in Albuquerque this month to renew old friendships and remember the good - and some not so good - old days.

"It occurred to me -- sadly I might add that I lost all contact with the those people," said Courington, a commercial artist in Albuquerque. "We were close. For a year and a half we lived in the same airplane.

"Some of these people I hadn't seen in 41 years and I decided to look everyone up."

Courington had been a flight engineer on a B-24 that flew 30 bombing missions over Europe between February 1944 and April In 1945 everyone was discharged

Although a few kept intermittent contact through the years, most crew members lost track of each other soon after they got

home, Courington said.
"I can't really say why we lost track of each other," he said. "But the war was over and we had done our job and it was time to get on with our lives.

In 1982 Courington joined the local chapter of the 8th Air Force Historical Society and became inspired to reunite his World War II comrades.

But after the inspiration struck, the work began. Courington searched for a year and a half before he located the first of his lost crewmates, the plane's navigator who was a retired osteopath living in Arizona.

Within a year after that, Courington located all of the lost crew members and he began organizing the reunion. "Eventually we put it all together and we found them all," he said.

The other members were scattered around the country, from New York to California and from Wisconsin to Mississippi, Courington said. Their careers had taken them into divergent fields — the bombardier becoming president of a savings and loan, the radio operator working as a municipal employee, and the nose gunner becoming a petroleum engineer.

Courington said the warm relations the crew members enjoyed during their tour of duty 41 years ago were immediately recreated during the reunion in Albuquerque the weekend of April 18-20.

"It was a family-type relationship. We were brothers," he said. "And that same relation was present in this reunion."

Although they had 41 years of news to catch up, much of the time was spent

reminiscing about their war experiences, Courington said. The actual combat things - the flak, the

fighters, the planes going down - these were the things that triggered the memories," he said. "There were serious moments when we talked about it. We had - that was part of it.

"But now that that's over the good times are much more important." The old soldiers are planning to get back together next year at Lake Tahoe, Calif.

I'm looking forward to continuing the relationship. It was such a dumb thing to let it go away during those if years,"

Courington said. "I'm sure we'll keep the relationship going now until we're all dead

and gone.
"I know I plan to keep it alive."

#### WHO WEN'T TO RACKHEATH

Vince LaRussa and I have talked many times about the completion of the roster of all who served with the 467th from departure for overseas to return to ZI. The fly home orders Vince got recently from Col. Shower added 274 new names to the 3600+ we had previously.

Vince wrote first the Lykes Bros. Steamship Co. to see if they had a passenger list from the movement of the 467th to England on the Fredrick Lykes. They did not have a list and explained it was not the Army's, to whom the ships was "bareboat" chartered, policy to furnish such a list. Upon writing to the Federal Maritime Commission to find a source of this passenger list, Vince's letter was forwarded to the Naval Historical Center to see if they had such information. The Naval Historical Center was only able to give the information that the Army's Center of Military History records of Army ships of World War II were destroyed about 20 years ago. The Center did send a page from Roland Charles' "Troopships of World War II" which is reproduced below.

So, again, look through your memorabilia. Send in copies of any orders you have. From them we may find a name or two to build the record of those who were assigned or attached to the 467th.

## 467TH BOMBARDMENT GROUP AND SQUADRONS INSIGNIA



A FTER circumnavigating Africa counterclockwise in 1942 and then making a few Atlantic crossings as a freighter to England and Oran, the FREDERICK LYKES was bareboat chartered on 1 July 1943 to the War Department for conversion to a troopship.

Upon completion of conversion work by Todd Shipyards at New York in early November, she sailed to Europe and returned to New York via Boston. The vessel continued in service between New York and the United Kingdom until sailing from Naples in June 1944 for New Orleans.

Before proceeding to the Pacific (via the Panama Canal) she stopped at Galveston (for repairs by Todd-Galveston Dry Docks, Inc.), Key West and Guantanamo. The vessel sailed from Panama in early August for Finschhafen, Lae and Langemak. She returned to San Francisco in September and then went to Seartle for repairs and alterations by Todd Shipyards to prepare the vessel for a high priority mission to Honolulu, Eniwetok and Guam.

The ship returned in December 1944 to San Francisco, where she underwent major repairs before leaving in February 1945 for Noumea, Espiritu Santo, Guadalcanal, Hollandia, Leyte, Townsville and Biak. She returned to San Francisco from this voyage but after a brief stay in port sailed in June, via the Panama Canal for UK and Le Havre, France. Returning to Boston, she went from there to Marseilles and returned to New York.

After a trip from New York to Casablanca and one from Hampton Roads to Marseilles in late 1945, the FREDERICK LYKES was declared surplus to the needs of the War Department and was redelivered to the War Shipping Administration on 13 February 1946 at Norfolk, Va., and on the same date transferred by the WSA to Lykes Bros. Steamship Co.
