

The weather was absolutely perfect and was the omen of things to come for our convention. One hundred seventy-seven members (102 veterans and 75 associates) were in attendance. Of that number, 36 were "first timers". Two 467th flight crews had six members each in attendance. Several other crews had 4, 3, and 2 members attending. Many other individuals represented their crew, ground personnel, and staff.

One of the convention highlights was the arrival of the restored B-24 "ALL AMERICAN", one of only three flyable B-24's in existence. This airplane's restoration cost in excess of \$1,300,000 and is a duplicate of a B-24 coming off the production line in 1944. What a sight to see! Nostalgia permeated the air that

surrounded her.

Other highlights on that wonderful weekend included tours to Offutt Air Force Base--Strategic Air Command Hdq., the SAC Underground Command Center, Fr. Flanagan's "BOYS TOWN", the "OLD TOWN MARKET" in downtown Omaha, the Heritage Museum, and for those who enjoy competitive racing of the four-legged variety, an afternoon at the dog track.

Roger Giblin, engineer on Bill William's crew, kept many in stitches with his comic chatter. He also videotaped many interviews with the attendees and has presented the tape to the Association to become a part of its memorabilia. Vince Re took many colored still photographs for our viewing pleasure at next year's reunion and displayed many of those he took at the 2ADA Reunion '90 in Norwich. MEMBERSHIP MEETING OF MINUTES BOMBARDMENT GROUP (HEAVY) ASSOCIATION, LTD.

The President, John E. (Jack) Stevens, opened the annual meeting of the membership of the 467th Bomb Group (Heavy) Association, Ltd. in the Red Lion Hotel, Omaha, Nebraska, on October 6, 1990. The following officers and members of the Board of Directors were present: Gregory, Robert Salzarulo, John Stevens, Robert Sheehan, Ralph Elliott, Phillip Day and William McGovern.

President Stevens announced that the terms of Geoff Gregory and David Swearingen on the Board of Directors had ended and that Vince LaRussa, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, was placing in nomination Theodore (Ted) Wheeler and Floyd Pugh as Directors. Both were unanimously elected. Other members of the Nominating Committee were Walt Mundy and Charles Caldwell.

Geoff Gregory gave a report on the Historical Marker which has been placed on the site of the Rackheath Base and which was dedicated in a ceremony held at the site during the recent reunion of the Second Air Division at Norwich. He stated that the land for the marker had been donated by Robert Lomax and that Mr. Lomax and other English friends had donated the marker foundation and the flag poles to each side of it. He further stated that our Honorary Member, David Hastings, most generously paid the VAT (Value Added Tax) tax of nearly 400 pounds which had been assessed on the marker.

Chairman of Conventions Salzarulo reported on future meeting sites for the association and stated that the next convention would be held at Tucson, Arizona during the month of October, 1991. Ralph Elliott, who would be Coordinator for the convention, reported on the various places of interest in the area. Chairman Salzarulo continued that thought was being given for a convention of the Association to be held in England in 1992 or 1993. Many raised hands indicated favor for the 1993 date.

Phillip Day gave a report on the events of the 1990 Convention and those that were coming

Upon motion of Day, it was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that all veteran and associate members of the 467th Bombardment Group (Heavy) Association, Ltd. present at the 1990 Convention at Omaha, NE be declared as delegates to the Convention.

It was reported to the meeting that Bill Dillon, Chairman of the Awards Committee, had processed award recommendations for thirteen English friends of the 467th in recognition of the work they have done for the Group.

to the awards were presented individuals at the buffet supper held villagers in Norwich on July 29, 1990.

President Stevens gave a report on some of the highlights of his year as President of the Association. He stated that Bill McGovern and Phillip Day had successfully obtained a tax exemption for the Group and that there was a possibility that the veteran members attending the Convention could recapture some of their expenses by way of tax deductions, but cautioned that they should consult with their tax advisors. He thanked Robert Lomax for donating the land for our marker at Rackheath and stated that we now own this land permanently. He further said that at a meeting of the Directors held on the previous evening the matter of a museum for the 467th Bomb Group was discussed. This would contain memorabilia of the organization and the matter of funding it would be looked into. He announced that the Board had passed a resolution honoring Colonel Albert Joseph Shower and naming Colonel Shower as "Honorary President" of the Association.

Upon motion of Phillip Day, it was unani-mously resolved that all actions taken by the Board at its meeting on October 5, 1990 be approved.

President Stevens then read a biograpy of Al Shower and highly praised him for the work and dedication he had shown to the Group both during war time and at the various activities of the Group and Association since the war. He then presented Colonel Shower with a Certificate of Appreciation.

President Stevens then read citations for the following outlining their contributions to the Association and Colonel Shower presented the Appreciation Awards:

Vince LaRussa then talked about the history of the Association and how it had started with 350 names which had been accumulated by Doris and Ray Betcher and that today our roster has names of over 1,100 veterans who served with the Group. He talked of Healy's "History of the 467th", which concerns the history of the Group and named those who had helped with contributions towards its successful reprinting on two occasions. He stated that a reprint of the book is available from him for the sum of

Lloyd Haug presented Phillip Day with a check in the sum of \$300 for the Group Mail-Memorial Funds, which were proceeds derived from the cap project which he had undertaken.

Walt Weaver talked of the progress of the Eighth Air Force Heritage Center which is to be built at Savannah, Georgia, probably starting in 1992. He asked for donations from the 467th to help in its funding. No action was taken on this request.

Upon motion made and seconded, the meeting was adjourned.

LETTER FROM EDWARD W. KING

Of major interest to me was the POOP newsletter of July 1987 with Group Lead Pilot Ralph W. Elliott's account of the Nienburg Bridge (Weser River) mission of March 3, 1945. That mission was particularly memorable for me, as I was flying Deputy Lead to the second Squadron in the formation—the 789th. And thereby hangs a tale, as the saying goes. That was my crew's 19th mission, and we had

That was my crew's 19th mission, and we had been flying deputy squadron lead for a long time—lugging that Norden bomb sight over Germany and back without ever having had a chance to use it for anything beyond a "tracking device" for my Bombardier, Roy Flay, to pick up the target and monitor the Squadron's progress in approaching it. We were to be ready to take over if the lead ship had trouble, but otherwise we were not allowed to use it. (But it was a bonus to have such a ringside view of the bomb run though; nice to hear Roy's comments as we went down the bomb run; that was usually "We're right on target!") On that Nienburg Bridge mission, we were

On that Nienburg Bridge mission, we were greeted with a beautiful, blue sky--just a few scattered cumulus clouds, the most ideal weather one could have for visual bombing. And no enemy planes or anti-aircraft fire anywhere near the target. Our first run to the target was picture perfect: "Right on!", reported Flay. But for no ascertainable reason, the Squadron Leader did not drop. So around again we went and made our second run. "Right on", said Roy; but again no drop!

"What in hell are we waiting for", I thought,
"the German fighters to get around to us?" And
for the third time we started down the bomb
run. "Right on target again" said Roy. "They
sure as hell will drop this time," I thought.
"Roy" I called, "put your trigger up" (meaning
we will drop our bombs by the bombsight, rather
than on the bombs away signal from the Squadron
Leader.

"That's against the rules," said Roy. "I know it," said I, "but I want to make sure that at least once you will have the chance to show them that you're a damned good bombardier."

Roy objected again, and I said, "Put that trigger up Roy; that's an order!" Up it went, the indices crossed and out went our 1,000 pounders while the squadron lead ship and the rest of the squadron held onto their bombs!

"Get those hand-held cameras going on our drop," I hollered over the intercom. "We're in deep trouble if we don't hit that bridge and have the proof that we did it! Everybody, watch that drop."

And sure enough, our bombs hit it dead center, and the bridge went down into the Weser River!

There being no point in making any more runs on that target, we went on to the Secondary—the Bielefeld railroad viaduct, where we three squadrons encountered a helluva lot of flak. My plane had no bombs to drop, of course—we were just along for the ride. But having no "mission" but to tag along, my mind was free to experience and dwell on my severe guilt feelings over probably having caused this diversion to the secondary. As we were jolted around in that maelstrom over the target, I prayed hard that no one would be wounded or killed. (I don't know that anyone was; I don't recall that I had the courage to inquire.)

Elliott's account of the Nienburg Bridge bombing says "The Squadron behind us had managed to drop as well, but the other two squadrons still had bombs on board so we headed for Bielefeld...". Allen Healy's history (pg. 77) says of it "...our lead Squadron, with Col. Shower flying as Command Pilot, found a rift in the clouds and, despite a terrific cross wind that brought the formation across the bridge at a 45-degree angle, the pattern was squarely on the bridge" and the other "three Squadrons hit Bielefeld..."

Healy's statement that three Squadrons hit Bielefeld is closest to 100% correct. But it would have been more accurate to say:

"Three Squadrons hit the Secondary target, Bielefeld—but the "Massilon Tiger," flying deputy lead in the second squadron, had no bombs to unload on Bielefeld, having dropped its bombs dead center on the Nienburg bridge in the last pass of its Squadron over that target."

If Elliott's account that "Fourteen 1,000-pound bombs landed directly on the bridge" is correct, I am sure that four of them came from "The Massilon Tiger"—the four that finally sent the weakened bridge crashing into the river! Or perhaps 18 bombs hit that bridge?

Roy did not get the DFC--which I thought he deserved--for his craftsmanship with the Norden bombsight that day, but at least he had the satisfaction of having proved that he knew how to use it!

(Editor--This will probably cause some rebuttal which we will publish as received.)

LETTER FROM GEORGE BRISON

Dear Phil, In the last copy of "POOP" was a letter from Charley Caldwell, May 10, 1990. He asked about Harvey P. Pettit. He was certainly a pilot and a very good one too. I flew 21 missions with Harvey as a "Ball Turret Gunner." I was with him on the mission when he was struck by flak, tore up his leg and lodged in the pelvis. There was no nose turret on the plane, so the flak had nothing to strike before hitting Harvey. (Editor-This needs some clarification.) I made two trips from the waist to the front; one with heated blanket and one with knife, which we used to slice his pant leg and give him a shot. On the 2nd trip up front, I ran out of oxygen and passed out on the catwalk in the bombay. Jimmy Dewhunt (radio man) saw me and brought a full oxygen bottle to me so I was only out a few seconds. We returned to our base on only two engines, piloted by the co-pilot, a young fellow with only one combat landing, so as we came in to land, he shoved the throttle forward to take off again, which we couldn't do on only two engines. Brenderman, the navigator, flying in Harvey's seat grabbed the throttle and brought us down on one wheel off the runway, bounced back up and down again on the other wheel, tearing the tips from both wings; but on the

ground and we got Harvey to the hospital.

I flew the balance of my missions with different pilots, a total of 32. I visited Harvey in the hospital just before I left for the U.S.A.

Harvey and I have kept in touch all these years.

Hope this info has helped you.

years as a procurement officer and went to work for Howard Hughes in Vegas.


We liked each other so well, 45 years later, he drove on up to Fox Island, near Tacoma, WA, as our house guest. If hot air were money, we'd be millionaires.
