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FROM THE PREZ - RALPH DAVIS

Things are looking good for the next convention in Tucson. Ralph Elliott's daughter, Donna, has things well under control as you will note in the planning for the convention that follows later in the newsletter. We should have another good one and as always we shall enjoy the good weather of southern Arizona. You want to get your reservations in early for the hotel (directly to the hotel) and for the convention costs (directly to Donna) as indicated on the reservation forms. The hotel has a 48 hour reservation cancellation policy so register if you think you are coming, it's refundable. We are in the process to see if we can get a tax exempt status for the group. There will once again be an early bird drawing for the cost of the convention, \$225.00, for those who pay in full by or before August 1, 1999.

Do to the untimely passing of Walter J. (Tozz) Robinson, a director of the organization. I have reviewed with the Board of Directors and have their concurrence to appoint Charles H. Clawson of Sacramento, CA as replacing Tozz for the balance of his term which runs until the convention in 2000. Mr. Clawson was one of two to respond favorably to represent the group as a director. The results of the survey are covered elsewhere in this newsletter.

We still are getting questions concerning the Home Page on the Internet. The correct address (or URL) for the page is "www. siscom.net/~467thbg". The E-Mail address for the group is "467thbg@siscom.net". Bob has been revising the pictures and data in our page as we hit the maximum amount a few weeks back. The page is 20 meg size. He has reduced it to around 11-1/2 megs and we now have room for more photos and other data. We need crew photos and individual photos, then and now photos to add to the page. We will scan them and return them to you as soon as possible. The page is no better than the support we get from the members, or the families of the members. We would like to have a

photo of every single member and crews both flying and ground.

Marsha Helton Bletchford, daughter of Lt. Edwin M. Helton, who was the pilot of the Osage Express contacted us regarding contacting someone who knew her father and could share some stories. She also wanted to know where her father was buried. Marsha was born in November 1945, 5 months after her father was killed and she never had the chance to know him or share his experiences. Her half brother, who is interested in WWII history also contacted us through the home page. Both have been in contact with Andy Wilkinson who along with others are trying to draw a closure to the mystery of this lost crew of the 467th. The remains of Lt. Helton were never found. His name is on the Wall of the Missing whose bodies have never been recovered, in the Netherlands American Cemetery. Mr. Jim Fogerty of DePue Monument Inc. advised that the cost to duplicate the 467th memorial stone in England for the Memorial Gardens at the 8th Air Force Heritage Museum would be \$2,826.70. The cost breakdown is as follows:

\$1,970.00 - Cost of Grey granite with Steele finish.

225.00 - B-24 silhouette cast with red and white 467th markings.

131.70 - State tax.

500.00 - Maintenance and up-keep fee to the Museum.

This cost subtracted from the amount allocated of \$7,000.00 will allow us to apply towards the Bombardier Sponsorship the amount of \$4,173.30, leaving us \$776.00 balance to the Museum. The action regarding the Bombardier display was item #4 in the Board Actions listed elsewhere in this newsletter, that were accomplished during this period.

467TH HISTORY BOOK COMING TO THE END

First published by Allan Healy in 1947, "The 467th Bom-

467TH HISTORY BOOK - CONTINUED:

bardment Group September 1943 - June 1945" chronicled the history of the 467th Bombardment Group from its training at Wendover, Utah through 212 combat missions and the groups return to the Zone of the Interior in 1945. This initial printing had limited distribution. During the 1979 convention at Hershey, Pennsylvania, funding was provided by ten members at that convention for the first reprint. Ralph Giesecke, group engineering officer, provided additional funding for the printing of three hundred books. This printing repaid the pledges made a Hershey and left a surplus for the 467th treasury. When Ralph Giesecke declined to accept his portion of the pledge, it became the surplus to the treasury that enabled our "No Dues Policy" for the membership and was quickly oversubscribed. The current third printing of five hundred books includes material that was not available for the original printing and of course the first and second reprints. This addendum and errata would include names of members not found in the original first and second printings. Allan Healy wanted to include a roster but he was not able to gather complete personnel information and therefore the roster was not complete. The third reprint would attempt to correct this oversight.

Phillip Day began a major effort to identify all members who served with the 467th from September of 1943 through June of 1945 when the group returned to the Zone of the Interior. This addendum and errata would include information that was not available for the original and first reprint.

Two hundred twenty three (223) personnel were KIA or KI-LOD. Five thousand two hundred seventy-eight members (5,278) have been identified as members who served with the group. Included in the addendum and errata are listings of the KIA's and KILOD by alphabet, date and aircrew. Cemeteries are shown along with maps illustrating the location of the cemetery and surrounding area.

Our inventory of the third reprint, with an addendum and errata, is currently 26 books. It is time for this project to end. It has been rewarding for me and financially successful for the group. It led a charmed life and has been an inspiration for all members. Payment will cover the cost of the book and postage. The books will be sent on a first come first served basis. THIS IS THE FINAL OFFER. THERE WILL NOT BE ANOTHER REPRINT. It has been my pleasure to be associated with this project, and thank you all for your support.



BARSHAM MEMORIAL – RALPH DAVIS

The Barsham Memorial for Lt. Reid's crew will hold their dedication on 24 April, 1999. This is a memorial dedicated to the crew that was shot down during the intruder attack of April 22, 1944. Seven lost their lives in the crash. Four bailed out, one crew member's parachute did not open, three survived. Two of the three died in combat on other crews and Mervin Shank is the only surviving member of Reid's crew. Mervin Shank and his wife, Mary, are flying over to attend the ceremony. Mr. Denis Sporle, as we identified in an earlier newsletter, is heading up this effort. The 467th donated an amount to support this memorial. The memorial wording was coordinated with Andy Wilkinson and he forwarded it to me. Mervin and I reviewed and edited the wording. Denis is meeting Mervin and his wife and will see to their transportation and lodging in the area. As always, our English friends go out of their way to make us feel at home in their country. Mervin will take pictures and see that we have good information and photos to cover this event in the next POOP.

REUNION AFTER 53+ YEARS – RALPH DAVIS

Tommy Hoyer pilfered a turkey leg from Steve Barilich's kitchen to share with his buddy Bob Hine on December 31st, the night before Bob's 23rd mission over Germany. Hine was shot down on 1 January and became a prisoner of war. Hoyer and Hine, strangers at South Bend Central High School, became good friends in wartime England at Rackheath. Hoyer grieved over his lost friend and at wars end decided to take Hine's gear home to the family. The second day home, Hoyer was dreading taking the gear to Hine's wife, Marjorie. Explaining his dilemma to his dad, he was informed that some two weeks earlier a Hine had called to see if he was home yet. They got together and Hoyer gave Hine his gear. Some 53+ years later all three got together again and Barilich, a mess sergeant for the Officers and flying personnel brought his book on the 467th and Hines brought the clothes that Hover had brought to him. Then suddenly Hine remembered he was missing something. He asked Tom what had ever happened to the 18 quarts of champagne that he had hid at the end of the barracks. The story that I heard was that Hoyer said, sorry, your buddies never told me about that. To this day, we do not know who got the champagne! Was it good Tom?



MEMORIAL LIBRARY – RALPH DAVIS

An article from the Eastern Daily Press was sent to me by Perry Watts. It states that the library is on target according to officials for opening in March 2001. Construction should start, with tongue in cheek, April or May this year despite the fact that the site is still knee deep in archaeologists. A Viking gold ingot – the only piece of its kind ever found in Britain was unearthed in Norwich on the site of the new Millennium Library. The research assistant with the Norfolk Archaeological Unit said the team was now 90% certain it is ninth or tenth century origin. He believes it was brought over to England by a Scandinavian immigrant during the Viking invasion and used as a form of currency. The tiny ingot (1cm by 5cm) was found on the old library floor of a 17th century cellar which is being excavated. The finding of such priceless articles has spread considerable interest and to some degree could slow down the library effort, if more were found.

With many thoughts of who will give a firm date, will senior citizens be given training on some 59 PC's, how will cost compare to the old one and finally, despite his many comments, he was sure that once it is all completed everyone will look at it and say it was worth the wait, that is if they can find somewhere to park nearby. Seems that our English friends have similar problems to states side.

MEMORIAL LIBRARY BOOK PURCHASE -BY WALT MUNDY

Derek Hills, Trust Librarian sent a list of books purchased on behalf of the 467th Bomb Group under the endowment program. This year, aside from the purchase of the core material on the 2nd Air Division and the Eighth Air Force, heavy weight was given to the provision of major American reference works:

- 1. Making the Corps: A story of Bootcamp Platoon 3086, the Marine Corps and America by Thomas E. Ricks.
- 2. American Photo Journalism Comes of Age by Michael Carlebach.
- 3. The American City: What works, what doesn't by Alexander Garvin.
- 4. American Eagles: A history of the United States Air Force by Ron Dick.
- 5. Notable US Ambassadors Since 1775: A biographical dictionary edited by Cathal J. Nolan.
- 6. Big Game of North America by Erwin Bauer.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS ACTION – RALPH DAVIS

The Board of Directors acted upon and approved six items during this period.

- 1. Agreed upon Charles H. Clawson to finish out the balance of the directorship of Walter J. Robinson who passed away on 30 January, 1999.
- 2. Because of the difficulty in obtaining coordinators for conventions, the board agreed to allow and added cost to the convention of \$10.00 per person, but not to exceed an overall amount of \$1,500.00 for someone outside the organization. A member doing coordination is allowed \$500.00 for the performance of such duties to cover the expense and time allocated.
- 3. Because the cost of providing support to the Second Air Division as 2ADA Vice President is becoming more expensive, it was approved to have the treasury support such Ex-com meetings for the amount of \$125.00 per night, but not to exceed three nights.
- 4. The 8th Air Force Heritage Museum accepted our donation of

\$5,050.00 and suggested that we have a sponsorship of a display at the museum. Since the 467th set the 8th Air Force bombing record at Point de Grave and the Bombardier display did not have a sponsor, they suggested we use that one. The cost is \$10,000.00. We have \$7,000.00 designated for the replica monument in England for the museum and we can get a gray granite with black lettering for around \$2,800.00. The proposal that was approved was to use the balance of the funds to support the bombardier display. The display will name the 3 lead bombardiers and specify the details of the record set by the 467th.

- 5. The last convention business meeting left open to interpretation as to who is eligible to participate in the group management process. Several of us thought that it was open to all associate members as well as regular members. However, Bill McGovern, Group Secretary, believed it not to be open to all. This issue was brought up to the directors with a choice of (a) All associate members, (b) Family associate members only (-AF), and (c) Hold the issue for the next business meeting for more discussion. The vote was four (4) for all associate members and one (1) no indication, but stated last man organization. Bill McGovern suggested to wait till the next business meeting.
- 6. Because we need to provide funeral recognition for active and former directors, past and present officers and Group and Squadron Commanding Officers, it was proposed to provide and amount not to exceed \$75.00 to provide a red and white floral display for those who we have sufficient notice. For those notifications not in time, a planter will be sent to the family.

As always, these items will be brought up at the next business meeting in Tucson.

MISCELLANEA BY PHILLIP G. DAY

The requirement for this piece is not set in stone, but the time to submit it to the Editor and Publisher is, so here we go.

We had no winter here in Shreveport, four days when temperatures went below freezing for several hours in the day and maybe ten others when we had frost. Our fireplace was not used over two dozen times, we didn't burn a quarter of a cord of wood and that was left over from last year. Even that much toting by Miss Cille was enough to convince her we should get "natural gas logs" in the fireplace which we will do before next fall. Al "Wabbit" Welters sent me a picture of his stacked firewood, a whole yard full. "Wabbit", we wouldn't burn that much in ten vears.

The lack of cold weather confused both plants and animals. Pesky sparrows seemed to bred and nest without let up. I have a six compartment martin (bird) house and had our yard man take it down and clean it out in mid February. All six compartments were choch-a-block full. He put it back up, I neglected to tell him to leave it down, and as soon as it was up again the sparrows started again bringing in nesting material. The martin scouts came in on March 1, looked around, then off again to see what else was available. The pairs and females should be here in a week or so and then they can run the sparrows off.

Our pear tree bloomed out early, then we sweated out frosts but it appears it has set pears. Now if we don't have a hard freeze late like last year, we should make enough pears for chow-chow (relish) and preserves and maybe a few pear instead of apple pies.

We ate salad greens and spinach through the winter and have some mustard greens about ready to pull. Sparrows again ate on the tender leaves of the lettuce but we planted enough for both them and us. Miss Cille has worked the beds so we can plant our tomatoes (eight, four verities), green sweet peppers (six, three verities) and eggplants (four, two verities) on Good Friday be the good LORD willing.

Squirrels (tree rats) seemed to have starved to death around our neighborhood this winter, they are very scarce right now thank goodness. We had no pecans on the trees in the neighborhood nor were there any acorns. Mourning Doves have found that it is safer in the city than in the country, because you cannot shoot them in the city, and it isn't unusual to see a dozen or more in the vards or on the power lines around our house.

Enough of the flora and the fauna. Miss Cille and I will be going to the Second Air Division Reunion in May in Austin, TX.

Looking forward to it as we have a number of friends in the 2ADA that we haven't seen in some time. Then we plan on also attending the 467th Convention in Tucson. There should be information on the convention in this POOP.

I am in Pulmonary Rehabilitation three days a week for about two hours, mostly physical exercises, and I feel better physically and mentally than I have in a couple of years.

In retrospect, I now wish I had taken my "Box" with me and made arrangements to demonstrate it a time or two, especially since I had driven to St. Louis and could have easily carried the box (about the size of a VCR) with me. In the same vein, I would recommend that everyone visit a Sears or Circuit City store for a free demonstration.

Along with a number of relatives and acquaintances, I have used mine to E-mail several in our B.G. including one from England (Andy) and one from Hawaii with great satisfaction. As our members dwindle, I see it as a means of holding a nucleus of our members together and help to perpetuate our alumni. It could also serve to foster mini-reunions in FL or elsewhere where people may be son inclined.

My set is a WEB TV Plus by Phillips Magnavox with a Sony wireless keyboard, for which I paid approximately \$300. Not positive on the price since I also bought a 3 yr. Service contract, because for me it was high tech equipment which I know absolutely nothing about and I expected to move it back and forth from FL to NY, etc.

I FL we paid \$19.95 per month for 24 hour internet service. That service is not available here in Jamestown, so Web reduces their charge to \$10.00 per month. We also pay Alltel NY \$20.00 a month, but the Internet cost may be different in different areas.

As you alluded to, I think even the most "computer scared" person would find it to be affordable, easy to operate without formal instruction, and equally important, would find it enjoyable, informative and entertaining.

As I highly recommend WEB TV, please feel free to use any part of this as a direct quote or otherwise to promote the idea.

Recently, we are told by our Web-TV service (which is always thereto help us out, solve any problems, and upgrade the software automatically so we have the latest improvements they have made) that we have been up-graded so that we now have the capability (1) to transmit photographs; (2) even use our machine to set up our VCR; and (3) that it will now also support a printer without an adapter too. I don't have a printer, but a friend does, and it does a fantastic job.
